

SETTING GROUP EXPECTATIONS

The directions below have been taken from Ruth Haley Barton's Book, Sacred Rhythms. They provide a great framework for setting the posture of how the group makes space for each other and what the expectations are. On the sheet attached, write down any additional expectations/ values/ norms your group would like to highlight, add, or prioritize.

- "Guide the group in making the following basic commitments as they journey together (if needed, encourage them to add any other values or commitments that will increase their sense of willingness to commit themselves to the group):
- We will be faithful engage with the material.
- We will support and pray for one another as we each explore what wholeheartedness looks like in our lives and respond faithfully to God's invitations along the way.
- We will respect each other's personal relationship with God understanding that each person's relationship with God takes place at God's initiative and within his leading and control.
- We will create and maintain a safe environment for questions and wondering. This means we will listen rather than fix and ask questions rather than give answers.
- We will seek to increase our self-awareness and be appropriately self-disclosing respecting our own boundaries and those of others.
- We will pay particular attention to the times and ways in which God is moving in each person's life and seek to affirm evidence of each person's growth and transformation.
- We will honor confidentiality*. What is shared in the group stays in the group!

Remember that the focus is on transformation, not information. Closing your time with prayer that celebrates what God is doing in each person's life and affirms each person's spiritual desire and intent for the week to come is an important way of "gathering up" all that has been shared and entrusting it to God."

**Leaders concerned with harm to self or others (or by others) will need to report this to a Pastor.*

WRITING JONAH

Verse Breakdown for those who would like to take up the practice of writing out the book of Jonah over the 8 weeks we will be meeting. Writing out scripture interrupts our quick reading and makes us slow down and notice things which might not have otherwise stood out. This practice is optional, though encouraged.

Aim for a regular rhythm of writing out a few verses a day or choose 2-3 days a week to sit and copy verses for a set amount of time.

REFLECTION CHARTS/ SCRIPTURE

Use what works for you! Scripture is followed by the reflection Chart so you can easily read and take notes in the margins or the grid.

REFLECTION CHARTS

Use the charts as they are helpful for keeping track of what stands out to you as you read Jonah and Listen to the sermons. As the weeks go on, you might begin to see connections and themes emerge as you look back on your notes. Below are some tips for using this section.

This portion is the same for each week. There is no need to hurry or do this all in one day. You can use the guidelines below as you read each passage. We suggest a regular rhythm of reflecting on these areas 3-5 times a week. You can reflect on one section per sitting as a way of slowing down. Do what works best for you. This tool is designed to help you settle in and have an authentic interaction with Jesus about your life. Write down or doodle your response to God. Don't strive for the right or perfect responses. After reflecting on the different categories, review your notes on the page, are there themes or questions you notice about your time reflecting in this way on the passage for the week?

DESCRIPTION OF CHART HEADINGS

- **Repeated words:** As you read, highlight words and themes that stand out or continue to come up
- **Curiosities:** What stands out as intriguing or makes you think, "Huh! Interesting..."
- **5 Senses:** Is there anything added to your understanding of your experience of this passages when you think about it as if you were there? Are there sights, sounds, feelings, tastes, smells, sensations which inform this passage?
- **Invitations:** Is there something that God might be prompting you about as you read? What might God's invitation to you be?
- **Questions:** What questions are coming up?
- **Main Point/s:** What do you see as the main point/s of this passage?

PREPARATION/ QUIETING MIND & HEART

- Prepare yourself to notice and listen. Offer your distracting thoughts and hurry to God. Take some deep breaths.
- Read the passage once through at a normal pace, then once more through slowly. Reading out loud can slow your mind down and help you notice.
- What words or phrases light up for you as you read the passage today?



SMALL GROUP DISCUSSION FORMAT/ GUIDE

THE WEEKLY PATTERN FOR DISCUSSION

OPENING QUESTIONS

Use a few minutes at the beginning of your time to follow up on any action items shared from last week.

- Was there a next step or application challenge that they took on this past week? What did they learn about themselves and following Jesus?

Set a time for one minute per person. Then go around and share on **one** of the bullet points:

- Your highs and lows for the week.
- Who was a hero to you this week? (who made your week a bit better or was a blessing to you?)
- What stands out as a place, time, or person where you noticed God in your week?

SERMON & SCRIPTURE DISCUSSION

Pray

Read the text 3x.

- What sparks your curiosity? Can you turn that into a question?
- What is the main point of the passage for this week?

Share questions you have to ask the Author/ God? What Questions stood out from the sermon?

- Keep a quick list so you can refer back during the conversation)

Observations (looking for clues)

- Repetitions? Contrasts? Images?


Ask further questions and loop back to the sermon. Discuss weekly sermon notes/ questions/ invitations to add to the discussion. Notice themes and threads that are emerging among your group discussion. Summarize some of the main points of your discussion before moving to the application.

Application

- **Pause. Set timer for 2- 3 minutes** and ask group members to write down one thing they want to hold on to/ remember from their conversation in the group. Often the discussion can be vibrant and motivating, but once we log off it is right back into our regular rhythms. Giving people a moment to pause before answering the application questions can be incredibly useful to solidify how they heard God's prompting in communal discussion. How does this scripture/ sermon inform how we understand God, each other, and ourselves.
- What does this passage tell you about God's character, Jesus, life as a Christian, or Scripture?
- What was life-giving? Share about why that is.
- What were the connections between the Biblical narrative and your life today?
- What might God be inviting you to do/pray/consider through this week's reading? Is there a common thread you are noticing that is standing out to you?
